

End of Term 4 Thursday 28th March 2024

Dear Parents,

In order to be as open as possible and to give parents lots of notice, I thought it would be helpful to share details of the class configuration for next year.

Despite having 65 applications for places in our Reception class for September 2024, we will only be accepting 15 children this year. The birth rate in Ashford has dropped and other KCC local schools are experiencing reduced demand. KCC will not currently support our expansion to a one form entry school and our Multi-academy Trust may face penalties from the Education Skills Funding Agency for us being more than 10% oversubscribed on our official Pupil Allocated Number (PAN). Taking 15 in Year R next year will have a knock on effect on our budget, staffing and proposed building expansion works. Karen Roberts, the CEO of TKAT, told me last week that the decision not to continue to expand the school will be kept on hold for the moment, and may be reconsidered if possible over the coming years.

We have therefore decided to split the current Year 3 class as they move into Year 4 in September 2024, and to combine these children into a Year 3/4 class and a Year 4/5 class. These classes will be smaller than the current Dickens class.

Classes for next year will be as follows:

Year R: 15 in their current classroom

Year 1: 27

Year 2: 26

Year 3/4: 27

Year 4/5:: 26

Year 6: 18 in the current Year 6 classroom

The current Year R and 1 will move up the school as 'bulge' classes, which will not be mixed.

The work to alter the configuration of the classrooms due to take place last summer, thus making 4 equal sized classrooms will take place this summer. These classrooms will house year 1,2, 3/4 and 4/5 and will be plenty big enough for the class sizes above.

If anyone would like to discuss this further, please do not hesitate to contact me.

There will be some slight staffing changes next term, as Mrs Venter joins us as Deputy Headteacher, Mrs Smith returns from being unwell and Mr Dixon moves to Dickens class.

Please see the staffing plan posted on dojo which explains this visually. Mrs Venter will be teaching Sassoon class one day/week instead of Mrs Leeks, and we have moved this day to Monday so that the children have Ms Coventon from Tuesday - Friday. Mrs Warner has moved her day off to Fridays so will be teaching Austen Class from Mondays - Thursdays, with Mrs Leeks teaching Friday all day and Tuesday afternoons for Mrs Warner's planning time. Dickens class will be taught by Mr Dixon, Ms Edmondson and by Mrs Venter on Friday afternoons, supported throughout the week by Mrs Smith, Mrs Avery and Mrs Leeks.

We are delighted to announce that we have been successful in winning a grant for musical instruments at Smarden. The grant of £938.97 will be spent on instruments for all classes, including the Nursery.

Thank you for all your support for our school and I hope everyone has a very happy Easter.



BLYTON CLASS

We've had a super term in Blyton Class! The children are making excellent progress in their phonics, writing and maths. We are delighted with how much they are reading at home. This is certainly having a huge impact on their reading ability.

We have been looking at growing plants this term and the children have really enjoyed growing seeds in the classroom- we currently have sweet peas that are germinating and of course their very successful cress growing.

We have continued to enjoy Forest School too. The seasonal changes are beginning to be noticeable so as well as lots of bug spotting, the children have started to recognise some of the wild flowers that we have growing in there such as primroses and bluebells. We have some lovely leaf and bug identification boards, kindly bought by FOSP which the children are beginning to use independently to help their learning outdoors. We will continue to have Forest School on Friday afternoons.

We have been so lucky with our visitors this term with the children learning about the police and also watching some classical music. We have of course also enjoyed visits from the bunnies and the lambs. If any parents would like to come in to talk to the children about their jobs or bring anything of interest in, please do let us know!

DONALDSON CLASS

Donaldson Class Newsletter

What a lovely term it's been! We have been focusing our learning around our key question and concepts which are, What can we do differently? Consequences, Resilience, Creativity.

English, Writing and Phonics

• We have been creating sentences containing the Year 1High Frequency words in spelling practice.

• We created a new setting and character for a familiar story and were able to form sentences using the Always Toolkit.

• Working hard in phonics developing our knowledge of sounds and reading words, especially with the Phonics Screen coming up in Term 5.

• We discovered some magic beans in school which engaged us to learn all about Jack and the Beanstalk.

• We've learnt how to put an exclamation mark into sentences to add drama/danger.

• Towards the end of term we have enjoyed writing for purpose focusing on SPaG and Always Toolkit. We wrote what we know about Spring (Science) and Instructions of how to cross the road (Jigsaw).

Maths

• This term's main focus has been adding and subtracting0-20. The children have worked really hard to represent equations differently using a range of manipulatives, as well as record their thinking in their books.

• We celebrated 100 days of school as a class which was a great retrieval of our knowledge and learning so far.

Science

• This term we have been carrying out an investigation of what plants need to grow. They have all grown differently and it's been great for the children to see. We had 4 plants and have closely monitored them and recorded their growth.

Jigsaw

• We had 2 experts come into school to share their knowledge about being healthy. First a Nurse came into school to discuss the importance of washing our hands and taught us how to put on a bandage. A Physiotherapist came into school next to share all the different ways we can look after our bodies and how important it is.

DT

• In DT the children have made a moving story applying the skills needed to achieve the outcome. We developed our understanding of how to be resilient when things wentwrong.

Geography

• We have continued to build on our knowledge of the UK over the last term, focusing on capital cities and finding the UK on the world map.

It was lovely seeing all of you at parent meetings and I hope you can join me in saying how far the children have come since September. I am incredibly proud of them all. IMPORTANT Please continue to support your child's phonics with QR codes and phonics booklets for the final push before the Phonics Screen in Term 5.

Have a lovely school holiday and see you ready for Term 5 on Monday 15th April 2024.

AUSTEN CLASS

Term 4 in Austen Class has been very busy!

In English we have enjoyed exploring some classic traditional tales. We have been creating our alternative versions of Goldilocks and the Three Bears, designing our own Three Little Pig comic book strips and writing in the role of Little Red Riding Hood. I have been extremely impressed with the children's writing and have seen a huge progression in their use of vocabulary and punctuation for effect. Next term, we will begin by focusing on writing instructions.

In Maths, we have been learning how to find the fraction of a shape and number, and we have been mastering how to tell the time. Many children find this a particularly tricky skill so I was proud to see their perseverance and determination shining through.

In Geography, the children have thoroughly enjoyed learning two very catchy songs to help them with memorising the 7 continents and 5 oceans of the world. It would be lovely if they could share these songs with you at home too!

Finally, in Science, we completed our learning about Animals including Humans, focusing on hygiene, healthy eating and exercise. We have also begun to learn about plants, labelling the parts of a plant and exploring wild and garden plants in our local area. We will continue to look at plants next term, exploring the conditions plants need to grow, sorting and dissecting seeds and recognising the plant life cycle.

Please note that in Term 5, I will be changing my teaching days to Monday – Thursday. Mrs Leeks will be teaching the children every Friday (all day) and Tuesday afternoon.

Swimming will continue throughout Term 5.

Our new inquiry question will be 'What makes a place special?' with a huge focus on the seaside both past and present to see how it has changed from 1950 onwards.

Finally, in Term 5 the children will begin to have a times table test once a week in preparation for Year 3. This will predominantly focus on the 2, 5 and 10 times table.

Thank you for all your continued support and I wish you all a very happy Easter. Enjoy the relaxing break and the large amounts of delicious chocolate we all get to eat!

SASSOON CLASS

I can't quite believe that the Spring term has come to an end already, we've been extremely busy.

In our maths learning we have been continuing with our multiplication and division topic but with much larger numbers. We've used the grid method to multiply and even looked at short division. We've also started to study fractions, in which our multiplication and division knowledge has proved to be extremely useful!

This term the children have written fantastically descriptive stories about defeating villains, which acted as sequels to 'Sheep-pig', our English text, involving personification, an incredibly handy tool in descriptive writing. They've also learnt how to write a set of instructions and have thoroughly enjoyed coming up with their own ideas for their last piece of writing.

Our geography learning this term has been all about rivers and flooding. As well as learning some key features of rivers, the children have learnt the difference between causes and effects of flooding. Our project centred around the idea of building resilience which we showed through creating flood barriers to overcome a flood. The children worked in teams to plan, design and build a flood barrier that would protect a paper house from getting wet. We spent time reflecting on why our flood barriers were successful or unsuccessful.

In our science topic, magnetic forces, we've learnt through practical investigations about magnetic poles, magnetic fields, which materials are magnetic and which materials interfere with magnetism.

Our DT learning this term was cooking, which centred around healthy seasonal eating, which the children absolutely loved! In the very first lesson we followed a recipe to make fruit skewers, which involved cutting similar sized pieces and assembling the fruit into a pattern. Next, we planned and designed our own vegetable tart, carefully selecting which seasonal vegetables would look the most colourful and taste the nicest together. In our final lesson we made our vegetable tarts, and I must say they were brilliant! The children used lots of skills like chopping a variety of vegetables and making sure they were all the same size and spreading the tomato puree evenly for a perfect base.

We have finished our swimming lessons for the year which gave us time to squeeze in one gymnastics lesson last week. We focused on balancing, particularly on the benches in the obstacle course, some children were even walking backwards or channelling their inner flamingo by balancing on one leg!

Have a lovely Easter break and I look forward to welcoming Sassoon back for Term 5.

DICKENS CLASS

This term in Dickens class has been an exciting journey.

We welcomed parents in our open classroom. It was great to see all who could come and the children were very proud of what they have accomplished this term.

In English we looked at writing our own villain stories , using 'Holes' for inspiration. We have now published our stories and can't wait to show parents the finished product.

We have shown great perseverance in Maths with fractions and decimals and year 5 even tackled angles and measuring these.

We have explored nutrition and recipes for an inspired Italian dish in Design technology.

In RE we looked at a variety of religions and how a place of worship can support faith but also how people may worship outside of a specific place of worship.


In PE we mastered gymnastics and explored movement through our use of the gym climbing frames. They are incredibly brave and coordinated!
